

Date and location announced for Wylfa Open Surgery in September

Horizon will hold its next Open Surgery at Cemaes Village Hall on Monday 17 September, at which local people can ask questions about plans for a new nuclear power station at Wylfa.

As with previous events, the September Open Surgery will give people the opportunity to meet Horizon's project team and find out more about its work.

The surgery will take place between 1pm and 7pm on 17 September at Cemaes Village Hall. No appointment is necessary.

Alan Smith, Head of Site Development at Horizon Nuclear Power, said: "While our shareholders seek new owners for Horizon, our local work such as Open Surgeries, and survey work essential to the project, continues. We also attended the Anglesey Show recently, and we will be returning to Holyhead for our October Open Surgery. Notes to editors

Horizon Nuclear Power was formed in January 2009 with the aim of developing up to 6,600 MW of new nuclear power station capacity to help meet the UK's need for stable and sustainable low carbon energy.

Following the conclusion of separate strategic reviews in March 2012, the company's shareholders – E.ON UK and RWE npower – have announced their intention to withdraw from UK nuclear and seek new owners for Horizon.

Horizon continues to build on the progress made in developing its site at Wylfa as it prepares the business for new owners

A new nuclear power station at Wylfa would deliver enough low carbon electricity for more than 5 million households. It is expected that around 5000 people would be employed during construction and around 800 permanent jobs during operation.
