

Date and location announced for Horizon's October Wylfa Open Surgery

**Horizon returns to Holyhead for its next Open Surgery, which takes place on
Monday 15 October at Holyhead Town Hall.**

As with previous monthly events, Horizon's project team will be on hand to meet people and answer questions about plans for a new nuclear power station at Wylfa.

The surgery will run between 1pm and 6pm on 15 October at the Town Hall, Holyhead, and no appointment is necessary.

Alan Smith, Head of Site Development at Horizon Nuclear Power, said: "Much of our work continues while we prepare the business for sale and that includes our monthly Open Surgeries to meet local people.

Notes to editors

- Horizon Nuclear Power was formed in January 2009 with the aim of developing up to 6,600 MW of new nuclear power station capacity to help meet the UK's need for stable and sustainable low carbon energy.
- Following the conclusion of separate strategic reviews in March 2012, the company's shareholders – E.ON UK and RWE npower – announced their intention to withdraw from UK nuclear and seek new owners for Horizon.
- Horizon remains optimistic that its plans for a new nuclear power station will be taken forward and is continuing with its work while it prepares for new owners
- A new nuclear power station at Wylfa would deliver enough low carbon electricity for more than 5 million households. It is expected that around 5000 people would be employed during construction and around 800 permanent jobs would be created during operation. www.horizonnuclearpower.com
